Preschool

The preschool children had a fun filled month creating Halloween art to decorate our classrooms. The junior kindergarten class finished their first language book, "Keep Running, Allen" and learned the play names and sounds for the letters "B" through "L". The children in the preprimary class and in the 2 year old program learned important self-help skills, following verbal directions and practicing handeye coordination through fun Halloween projects. What a month of hard work and fun!



Kindergarten: Mrs. Metz

The second month of school has been a busy one in the Kindergarten classroom. The Kindergarten families went to Tanaka Farms for a drive thru tour of the farm. Everyone had a good time with their families. The K students are telling time on the hour. They can count from 0 to 100 and by tens to 100. The students know the consonant letters and sounds and the two vowel rule (when two vowels are in a word, usually the first vowel says its name and the second vowel is silent). The class is learning blends, such as "tr" as in the word tree. I am pleased with the progress the students are making in their reading skills. In science, the students are learning about nocturnal animals, how plants grow like pumpkins and how we learn about the world around us, using our five senses. The students had fun with a day filled with Halloween activities, especially getting to wear Halloween costumes to school. I wish everyone a great fall season.





1st Grade: Ms. Vardeman

What's in our day? First grade starts the day with greeting others, calendar, weather, singing, sharing stories and discussing group work, such as story writing, grammar, or a project. We continue with "Morning work" where the children select activities and participate in new lessons. This is their opportunity to develop as independent learners. Students then gather for brief discussion at the teaching table, read, learn grammar concepts and practice printing. Language of the Numbers is a new math concept for most students and has a consistent and strong emphasis on problem solving, and model drawing, with a focus on indepth understanding. The curriculum covers a relatively small number of topics indepth and carefully sequences. The concepts are explicitly taught from concrete through pictorial to abstract. Students are expected to master each concept before moving on. Subsequent lessons build on prior concepts. First grade science program is experiential. Students can experience, see, and touch what they learn in the classroom. To have the student observe science up close is an integral part of the science curriculum. Just as important is inside and outside the classroom, this allows the student the opportunity to enjoy a well-rounded learning approach. Tuesday is yoga which is always met with a very positive response from the children. Yoga for children helps develop their flexibility, focus, coordination and balance. It is uplifting, noncompetitive, and a fun way for children to build strength, spirit, and self esteem.

2nd Grade: Mrs. Lambert

October has been packed with fun and exciting activities including our leaf pictures, apple science, Red Ribbon Week, and our Halloween party! The students especially enjoyed Red Ribbon Week; super hero day seemed to be the favorite. It was fun to see everyone dressed up in their costumes and having a good time playing the games at our classroom Halloween party. Looking forward, our class will begin learning new phonic sounds, reading about turkeys, and exploring the Mayflower and the first Thanksgiving. I am very impressed with how quickly the students have caught on to cursive writing. They are excited about each new letter we learn and always try their best. We continue to build a strong foundation with our basic math computation and problem solving skills, in addition to new multiplication facts, and equal equations. I look forward to seeing the students' growth throughout the next few months.

3rd Grade: Mr. Henderson

We are already in October and third grade is accomplishing learning objectives step by step! The students have been mastering their multiplication facts, sharpening their subtraction regrouping skills, and covering multiple basic math operations. We've also continued our study of the parts of speech. So far we've covered sentence structure, nouns, and verbs. The other parts of speech will be covered in the upcoming months. We also completed our first book report of the year with amazing success (Matilda). On a weekly basis we will continue studying new spelling and vocabulary words. The more the better! Third grade is an amazing journey and we remain excited about the challenges ahead!

4th Grade: Ms. Letcher

Wow, two months of school have flown by! This month, in the spirit of the Halloween season, Fourth Grade spent Friday mornings writing and sharing their own, often humorous, spooky stories; I have loved to see their creativity, personalities, and humor through their writing! In Math we learned to calculate elapsed time, interpret graphs and sequences, explored fact families, fractions, long division, and dipped our toes in algebra! Fourth Grade also dug deeper into California history, learning about the first Californians and how California's geography influenced its first inhabitants. In Science we explored ecosystems around the world from the largest organisms to the smallest microorganisms, then made our own rainforest food chain and ocean food webs. It was a monster mash jam-packed month with my Little Monsters! Witching you all had a Happy Halloween!
