Preschool

In February, the Junior Kindergarten class was busy learning all the letters and their sounds and practicing printing letters and numbers. They really have been enjoying lessons in art appreciation these past few weeks as well. The children in the pre-primary class and in the 2 and 3 year old program have also been very busy learning shapes, numbers, letters and also practicing to follow verbal directions and work on their listening skills. They all enjoy the fun art projects, circle time, music and Spanish every week!

The Kindergarten class had a fun Valentine's lunch and party. The students enjoyed giving Valentine cards and treats to each other.
